
One day, Davie walked to the play park near his house. It was his favorite place to play. There were slides and swings and a big sandbox.

Soon it was time to go home, and Davie decided to take the fire truck with him. He carried it in his arms and thought about how much fun he would have with his new toy at his house.


When Davie got home, he went into the kitchen for a snack and put the truck on the table.





Davie took his glass of milk and his apple and sat down at the table with his dad.




